A Message from the Sisters in Chone, Ecuador

"Let the little children come to me; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs." (Matthew 19:14)

Dear friends and collaborators of Help the Helpless:

Almost halfway through the summer, we will tell you of the highlights of the last few months so that you can rejoice and give thanks to God for the works that He is doing in the souls here in Ecuador:

In the month of June, we prepared 240 children in the parish of St. Cajetan for their first confession. Here in Ecuador, the children make their first confession one year before they make their first communion. Although they were nervous, they were well catechized and fully aware of what they were doing and receiving: God's forgiveness.

We would like to share the story of one boy who impressed us very much. When the day came for his first confession, after having prepared himself very well, he said to his mother, "Mom, I am so happy to be able to make my first confession. You should also go to confession because you are not living well. You are living in adultery; you have to get married." The mother was surprised by her son, and her conscience was also moved. From there, they went to church

where the little boy made his confession with full conscience and repentance for his sins. After praying his penance, the little boy, full of tears, gave his mother a hug, telling her how happy he was to receive such a great gift of God's forgiveness. Both the mother and son cried as they told one of the Sisters the story to which she replied, "Do you realize that your son is being a catechist to you—that God is speaking to you through your son?" The son affirmed this and also said that he wanted to be a priest one day.

This little boy has been able to learn the truth, to put it into practice, and has been moved by God to share it with his family. His message is this: that there is nothing greater than to have God dwelling in the soul, for which we have to have to be in God's grace. That is why we need the sacrament

of confession. We hope that soon we will be able to tell you the happy ending of this story with the reception of the sacraments of his mother and God willing, in the future, this child will become a priest of Jesus Christ. We entrust him to your prayers that it may be so.

This is just a sample of what the Lord allows us to see every day here in Chone. We see how through catechesis, the Lord spoke to the heart of this little boy who with courage, told his mother the truth with charity. This is why Jesus wants the children to approach Him. He wants to touch their hearts and have them as messengers of His Truth in their homes.

We thank you indefinitely for your prayers and help to be able to work in Ecuador. It is a great privilege to be able to be a witnesses in the front lines of God's work. We thank God for His immense goodness.

Thanks to all of you, as well. Keep praying for these souls, especially the children who undoubtedly please and comfort God so much.

A Message from the Sisters in Guayaquil, Ecuador

Dear Help the Helpless Friends,

We greet all of you and share with you our experience in the mission. These are hard times, but full of spiritual graces. The suffering of the people is increasing due to different factors: violence, which is increasing due to political instability, and drug trafficking and extortion that reaches even the poorest families who are trying to get by with some small business or honest work.

Additionally, it seems that the El Niño phenomenon is approaching. We are having frequent rains, and harvests have been damaged. Rice, which is the staple food of the families, has risen from \$0.30 a pound to \$0.70, and it seems that it will increase more in the coming months and even become scarce, because the farmers will not risk

losing the next harvest. This makes families

more and more in need, compounded by the existing physical poverty which is often accompanied by moral and spiritual poverty.

Despite all this, the Lord consoles us with experiences that gladden the heart. One experience that was both painful and joyful was that of Billy, a 7-year-old boy who eats at one of the soup kitchens. He began to convulse, and was hospitalized. He got worse and worse, and was diagnosed with untreated encephalitis. He was losing more and more of his abilities. The child was unbaptized. Thanks be to God, Fr. Mattew, a Servant Priest of the Home of the Mother, was able to give him baptism and confirmation. From that moment on, a whole cycle of ups and downs in the illness began, but the consolation is that, even in the midst all the suffering, there has been an enormous growth in the child's faith. He even expresses the desire to go to heaven, because he says: "I am already a child of God; the Father told me so. I want to go to heaven." Or when he regains consciousness after severe crises, he prays the Hail Mary and makes those who are with him pray. We ask for prayers for Billy, so that if it is God's will, He will take him to heaven soon, and if He wants to leave him here on earth, He will comfort him during so much suffering.

Another precious experience is the one we have had through the school support program. Children who have not been in school until now and who were not motivated, now begin to awaken the desire to

learn. The first thing we do with them is to go to the chapel, always ending with the prayer of the Angelus. They begin to build a friendship with Jesus and Our Lady. They are happy!

As they have almost no decent clothes, for Corpus Christi, with the help we received from you, our donors, we bought them a T-shirt with Our Lady on the front and a phrase on the back: All for Jesus, to console His Heart. It was beautiful to

see them looking so handsome, accompanied by the joy from Jesus in the midst of streets full of physical and moral misery, but comforted by the joy of these children, throwing petals and cheers to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament.

We are very grateful for all the help we receive from you, and we ask for your prayers, while assuring you to keep you in ours.

May the Lord grant us one day to meet in Heaven,

We are excited to take part in the Grand Book Fair which is taking place in our district of Thanjavur. St. Mary's bought many new books for our libraries (thanks to your generosity from the Easter special needs donations received). We give all

students access to library hours and encourage them to read a lot. We also encourage our students to compete in the state and national programs for essay writing, poem writing and elocution.

Thank you for all of those who send letters, emails, and gifts for your sponsored children. We celebrate each child's birthday with a cake and blessing from the priests, and all children receive chocolate. One of our children noted that he had never celebrated his birthday like this before. With tears in his eyes, he thanked us for this celebration of his life.
